When an elementary school teacher has a great idea for enhancing the expedition her students are working on, DEF is there. When a high school counselor recognizes that some students need help paying for an SAT prep course, DEF fills the need. When a school administrator realizes that prepaid cell phones would enable parents in homeless families to stay connected to their children's school, DEF steps in to help.

And when an instructional coach knows that just a little extra tutoring would enable students to reach – or even exceed – grade levels in reading, DEF bridges the gap.

For nine years, in cases likes these and so many more, DEF has supplied that missing piece needed for something important to happen. We've done that by raising and distributing funds, enabling volunteers to share their time and talents, and connecting people in our community whose support makes the difference between a good idea and a dream fulfilled.

The past year has been one of exciting changes and transitions at the Foundation. After years of gaining strength and momentum under the administrative auspices of City Schools of Decatur, we knew it was time for us to stand more independently. Whiz Kids: Renfroe Students Win Acclaim in 'Competitive Robotics'

f you're hoping that you'll someday have a robot to help you around the house, then keep an eye on a group of Renfroe Middle School students. They just might be the ones who build it.

The students, all members of a club called STEMCELL (which stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics Club to Encourage the Love of Learning), participated in the first Lego League Robotics Competition during the 2008-09 school year. Despite having never participated in "competitive robotics," the Renfroe students emerged as a force to be reckoned with. Each of the school's three teams captured honors and accolades, and one even made it to the statewide finals. A \$1,000 mini-grant from the Decatur Education Foundation proved to be a key catalyst for launching the robot engineers of STEMCELL. The funds helped buy materials, print team T-shirts, and cover registration for the competition. The DEF mini-grant was also leveraged into a \$1,000 donation from local engineering firm Merlab and a \$500 gift from an anonymous donor.

"The funds were needed because student interest was so high," says Lew Lefton, the parent coordinator for STEM-CELL. "We had 30 students join the club early in the year, and competition rules limit the teams to just 10 members." Renfroe's three teams were imaginatively named Diez Legos, Dancing Jalapeños and Legologists.

In building the robots, the students

worked after school for an hour and a half each Thursday. "Because the theme was Climate Connections, the robots had to accomplish climaterelated missions," explains Kevin McMahon, who teaches science at Renfroe. "So the students worked on a research project that involved identifying a climate-related problem that affected the Atlanta area, communicating with people around the world who were experiencing similar problems, and developing and sharing a solution." The Renfroe students arrived at the regional qualifier competition in December ready to wage battle against 26 other teams, many of which had competed before. Diez Legos placed third in Technical Robot Design and Dancing Jalapeños captured first place in teamwork.

As for the Legologists, they didn't place in any single category but their high collective score allowed them to advance to the Super Regional qualifiers in Warner Robins, Ga.

In January, days before the Super Regional, the Legologists met to work on their robot, only to find that their project board was missing.

"The coaches kept up a frustrated search for quite a while," McMahon recalls, "but the kids simply started from scratch to build a new project board. They showed really great teamwork – and they were still gluing things together during the car ride to the tournament."

The students' energy and effort paid off: out of 40 teams competing, Renfroe's Legologists placed third. Their research project, technical presentation and performance of their robot propelled them into the state competition at Georgia Tech, the Big Dance of Lego Robotics.

McMahon says that while the Legologists "performed well at

> Georgia Tech, unfortunately that was where our season ended." But no one was unimpressed with the accomplishments of all three teams, faring so well among 250 teams statewide in their inaugural season of robotics competition.





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Every Picture Tells a Story

Mini-grant enables Oakhurst teachers to weave Spanish and Art into Expedition

uring the spring of 2007, Frank Valerio and Mikki Durkin, Spanish language teachers at Oakhurst Elementary, teamed up with art teacher Amy Evans on an idea to weave Spanish and art into expeditionary learning: They would teach Oakhurst students how to make arpilleras.

Exquisitely detailed hand-sewn three-dimensional textile pictures, arpilleras originated in Chile, where women political prisoners used them to camouflage notes sent to helpers outside. They have become an integral part of the region's rich story-telling tradition. The teachers recognized that arpilleras would make a lovely piece of that year's second-grade expedition, "Everyone Has a Story," while also enabling children to make cross-discipline connections.

With a mini-grant from DEF for \$1,500, Valerio, Durkin and Evans purchased the supplies that helped them turn their idea into deed. These inspired and inspiring teachers began the project



by working with the three second-grade classes to create rough drafts of three areas of the Decatur community. The classes eventually selected one design each for their final products. The arpilleras they created were beautifully detailed pieces

that told stories about life in the community of Decatur.

The students created another set of arpilleras during the second semester. These were science-based and focused on the second grade's "Sun, Moon, and Stars" expedition.

The project's effectiveness was apparent in the

students' finely crafted final products and in how proud they were of their work. The classes donated three of the six arpilleras to the PTA Spring Fling fundraiser. These pieces created quite a buzz during the auction and brought in more than \$1,000. This money went back into the school system, further con-

necting art and Spanish to the community. The classes eventually used their designs to collaborate on another project, an investigation titled "Murals Tell Stories." Students researched mural painting, then helped design and create the mural that now decorates the downstairs hallway of Oakhurst Elementary. The mural was completely student-

generated, and was their interpretation of the Decatur community and how both Spanish and art connect with their lives. Oakhurst's second-grade expedition

deftly incorporated language arts and social studies. It also met several key

GPS standards and satisfied curricular objectives in both Spanish and art. The teachers incorporated math, science, and social studies into their Spanish and art instruction, providing the students with more opportunities to master

the GPS during the academic day. "We feel that we were able to facilitate more student participation and academic success through this project," said one of the teachers.



Mini-Grant Brings Off-Site Enrichment

ast year, with help from a mini-grant from DEF, Oakhurst Elementary's Exceptional Student Services teacher Tiffany Moody developed a program providing community-based instruction for students with disabilities. Over the course of the year, the students went on several outings into the community, where they were exposed to various settings and gained invaluable real-world experience.

Every day for a week, four students were taken to a MARTA station, where they practiced purchasing tickets and then using these tickets to ride the train or bus to get to destinations throughout



the city. By the end of the week, two of the four students could place exact change in the machine and retrieve their tickets independently. One of the students was able to navigate the group to the turnstyle and down the steps to where people wait for the train.

At the DeKalb Farmers

Market, students explored different sections in the store and interacted with employees behind the counter. They selected several items for making fruit salad, and unloaded these items from the cart during checkout. Two of the students helped the teacher count out dollar bills to purchase the items.

Only two students participated in the bowling trip, which allowed the teachers to work very closely with them. By the end of the trip, the students were independently retrieving the ball but continued to need help with placing their fingers in the holes.

Students also traveled to Stone Mountain's Great Barn, where they enjoyed a sensory experience; the Center for Puppetry Arts, where they worked hard on their take-home souvenirs (a fish puppet); and the Georgia Aquarium.

Fifth Grade Students Make History Learning About Influential Scientists

ast spring, fifth graders at Glennwood Academy introduced their school community to a group of influential scientists and educated them on how these individuals have made a difference in the world. This living history museum, funded by a mini-grant from DEF, was the result of a semester-long research project led by fifth-grade teacher Theresa Schilling.

At the beginning of the year, the students in Ms. Schilling's class each picked a historic figure they felt had had a significant impact on our world. They chose, among others, a psychiatrist who specialized in schizophrenia, a crypto zoologist, a doctor who was an expert on autism, and an anthropologist who researched Egyptology. They then set out to research these people. The grant also covered books the students used to do their research.

When the students had gathered enough information about their research picks, they then became these scientists and invited other students and teachers at Glennwood to visit their living history museum. The "scientists" talked about their research with museum visitors and an-

swered questions. "The project was fabulous because students were able to self-select a topic they felt made a difference in the world," said Ms. Schilling. "Through their research



they were able to decide if the topic they selected did impact our world, and how." Not only did the project reinforce the students' research and inquiry skills, but it was also experiential and fun, as well as educational for the school community at large.

Noah's Ark Service Project Benefits Animals and Children

vidence, the zebra found injured on the side of I-75 in April 2008, was one of the beneficiaries of a year-long service project carried out by Alison Mansfield's Pre-K class. DEF awarded the class a mini-grant to fund their work with the nonprofit organization Noah's Ark, a care home for foster children and an animal rehabilitation center, where Evidence was taken after recovering from his injuries. With money from the grant, the class took three field trips to Noah's Ark and completed a variety of projects to help the animals and children.

During the field trips, the students learned about the rehabilitation of the many exotic animals at Noah's Ark. "Several students decided they want to be animal rescue workers when they grow up," said Ms. Mansfield. The class grew especially fond of Evidence, whom they "adopted." They visited the zebra on his birthday with an edible gift that they had researched, purchased, wrapped, and decorated. They also met Evidence's caretaker, who taught them about the needs of zebras. The kids learned even more about Evidence and how he came to Noah's Ark from a book that they purchased for the classroom with funds from the minigrant.

In December, the class made holiday cards for the children in the care home. For Valentine's Day, they made gift baskets full of Valentine cards, patterned candy necklaces, tissue paper flowers, and more. The students also ran a wildly successful book drive at school to collect new and gently used children's books for the children's home. They collected, counted, carried, and presented more than 500 books, as well as diapers and canned foods, to Noah's Ark children's home.

Between visits, the class stayed in touch with Noah's Ark by writing letters to Miss



Diane, one of the directors. In turn, Miss Diane wrote to the class when new animals came to Noah's Ark, and she let them know how the children there were doing.

"Every task that the students completed for the service project was a socially conscious way to work on ageappropriate skills in literacy, math, social studies, and motor skills," said Ms. Mansfield. Through this project, the children gained greater appreciation for what they have and became more aware of how to help others.



TOUR deCATUR 2009 Seventh TOUR deCATUR Run Breaks Record

early 1,000 runners and walkers turned out March 21 for the Decatur Education Foundation's seventh annual TOUR deCATUR 5K. making it the best-attended Tour race ever. The event brought in more than \$14,000 for the Foundation, which provides support and enrichment for Decatur's children and youth. Funds go toward mini-grants and scholarships for students and teachers.

For the second year in a row, the race started at Renfroe Middle School and took runners on a course past Winnona Park Elementary and Oakhurst Elementary before returning to Renfroe. The morning began with a one-mile fun run, with many CSD students participating.



Four Decatur residents took top honors in the race. Kristian Blaich was the top finisher in the 5K (time: 16:50) and Ionathan Corso was the Masters winner (17:31). Christine Carlton finished first among women runners (19:48), and Joy Provost was first among Masters women (24:44).



"The TOUR deCATUR exemplifies how our community can come together to support our children and youth," says Gail Rothman, DEF's executive director. "This year's record attendance is proof positive that Decatur cares."

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Student EdVentures DEF Grants Help Students Gain Once-in-a-Lifetime Experience


wo Decatur High School students received grants from the Decatur Education Foundation to help cover the costs of traveling to Washington, D.C., for the historic inauguration of President Barack Obama.

Eilis Gehle, a freshman, and Vincent Antinozzi, a junior, joined 31 other Decatur High School students to attend the inauguration as part of the Close Up program. Both received \$500 Student EdVenture grants, which the Foundation awards to help students gain valuable education experiences.

Most of the DHS students who traveled to D.C. worked last summer and fall to raise money for the trip, which cost \$2,400 per student. Gehle and Antinozzi were among seven students who applied for DEF's Student EdVenture grants. "I'd never been to Washington before," Gehle said, adding that the swearing-in ceremony was a moment she will never forget. "You could see all of these people waving flags – and to see that many people who cared about our country and president was just amazing."

Chris Billingsley, a DHS social studies teacher, said the students participated in programs from 8:30 in the morning until 10 at night. They staged a mock presidential campaign and election, visited a number of area attractions and attended the Close Up inaugural ball.

EdVenture scholarship recipients complete an application that details their interest in a subject and why they would benefit from the trip. They also submit two teacher recommendations. DEF awards as many as five scholarships per


