Ashlea Edwards

Ashlea is pursuing a master's degree in educational leadership from Georgia State University.

From Ashlea: I teach every student – regardless of ability, social status, struggles and ethnicity – how to be successful, lifelong learners. As an educator, I take the time to teach my students a set of skills beyond academic standards. I

teach them how to struggle and grapple, how to build stamina and not give up when something is hard. I teach them about craftsmanship, perseverance, and collaboration. I find the best way to teach my students is by modeling these skills. They need to know that not everything in life is easy – you are going to struggle. How you handle that struggle is what sets you apart. As a special education teacher, people assume my students can't do it or won't learn it the same as other students. But this is absolutely untrue. When you set high expectations for an individual and you know they can meet that expectation, somewhere along the way, they know they can meet that expectation. And then something beautiful happens; they meet that expectation. Not because you only taught them the standards, but because you taught them how to grapple and how to persevere.

Ashlea Edwards has an accurate, deep, and current knowledge of special education. Ashlea is a teacher leader. She has served as the special education lead teacher, created the school's master schedule, and has led professional learning on student-engaged assessment practices. She facilitates the kindergarten data-inquiry team by analyzing and using assessment data to measure student progress and design instructional interventions. Ashlea has great rapport with her students and promotes respect and understanding of students with disabilities.
